### FCCB Council Meeting Minutes June 15, 2016

Attending: Carolyn Delgado (Chair), Priscilla McCatty, Scott Goetjen, Clay Hart, Pastor Ed, Coleen Dobo. Absent: Carol Wilson **Opening:** The Meeting opened with dialogue about the mass shooting at the LGBTQ club in Orlando with an impassioned agreement that as a church we need collectively and individually to (1) advocate for changes gun laws and (2) take a stand by being visible and partnering with like-minded groups in supporting social justice for LGBTQ people.

May minutes were approved.

**Stewardship Update:** A reminder letter will be send to the 18 people who pledged last year and have not responded just yet. With the pledges accounted for and projection of responses that have typically come in, it is anticipated that we will be about \$20,000 short from last year. This will have significant negative implications for funding ministry teams.

2016-2017 Slate of Officers and Team **Leaders:** With an eye on the constitution and the composition of the first slate under the new governance structure elected on November, 2014; Carolyn D is not eligible to remain on the slate for the coming year as Chair. There is a potential candidate for this position that will be presented in the annual meeting for vote. After an open discussion, it was agreed by all that no Council Member is eligible for the settled pastor search team to avoid any potential conflict of interest. As such, Clay H will vacate the member-at-large council position. Council reviewed that there are many ministry team leader positions without a candidate to present for vote at the annual meeting. There was considerable discussion and brainstorming of good people for the positions and all have an identified potential candidate except the Child

Development Center liaison position. Council Members will continue the recruitment process.

Pastoral Search Team Update: Clay highlighted initial activities of the search team. After the 9 search team members were commissioned at the June 12, 2016 church service, team members met to orient and arrange a first formal meeting. The first meeting was held this week on Tuesday, June 14 and a team structure was chosen. There will be a Chair (TBD), Secretary (Cecilia Simmons), and Spiritual Mentor (Michael Riley). The next meeting of the team is on June 28 when a Chair will be selected and the important task of creating a church profile will be initiated. Oz Gibbs has agreed to scribe the profile which will be approached as a living document of the historical development of the church, current status, and strategic plan for the future. Recognizing the critical role that the church profile will play in recruitment from potential candidates locally, nationally, and even internationally, the team will seek consultation in multiple formats from church members and attendees. including informal dialogue at church gatherings, organized listening circles, second hours, and focus groups. Input from all sectors of the congregation from youth to the homebound will be sought. Team members are functioning from the philosophy that their role is to be servants of the congregation to bring together everyone's input in the decision-making process.

**Pastors Report:** Pastor Ed introduced the standard form used to share information with family members who are planning a memorial service for a loved one. There was a discussion of the suggested family donation for staff who dedicate time to the service (e.g. music, maintenance, administrative tasks). It was agreed that the role of administrative assistant for memorial services is part and parcel of the general responsibilities of that

position. Pastor Ed reported on a very thorough process he undertook in creating staff performance evaluations, including meeting with staff, staff self-assessment, seeking input from 2 different lay members of the staff's strengths and growth opportunities. Pastor Ed emphasized that transparency and staff involvement were critical aspects of the evaluation process. After the council membership is chosen at the annual meeting, the Council Vice-Chair will join the Pastor in future evaluations, review job descriptions in light of the new governance structure, and, by September 2016, will ensure that each staff member has chosen objective and measurable goals for the coming year.

**Child Development Center:** Council reviewed a submission by the CDC for traditional bi-annual staff incentives and it was agreed by majority vote to provide incentive to each CDC staff member representing 0.014% of that staff member's annual salary.

**Review of Budget:** A summary review of the 2015-2016 ministry team budgets revealed the following: Music is over budget, Mission is on budget, Christian education is under budget. There were unexpected repairs required this past year. Fortunately, snow removal and heating monies were under used so we came out reasonably even. The 2016-2017 budget will be presented for vote at the annual meeting. Given that pledges are coming in lower than last year by a substantial sum as noted above, the projected disbursement to ministry teams will be negatively impacted. To present a balanced budget to the congregation at the annual meeting required that cuts be made to line items in the Boards of Christian Mission. Music, and Facilities Management. The data highlights that in order continue funding programming at the same level as last year, there needs to be an increase in income. Respectfully submitted by c dobo 6/26/16

# Annual Meeting Told Revival Lies In Justice Work

WEST HARTFORD (06/14/2016) -- Attendees to the 149th Annual Meeting of the Connecticut Conference June 10 - 11 were called upon to revitalize their churches by working for justice.

"There ain't no closet prophets," said Bishop Yvette Flunder, the keynote speaker. "Come out! Get in trouble, make trouble, be trouble until righteousness rains down like water; justice, like water."

Flunder said the entire world is listening for the sound of Pentecost, for a justice message to come from the United States that is greater than the "continual vitriol" that has been such a part of the current presidential election.

"This election is a game changer," she said. "We've never seen anything quite like this. Now, we need the voice of the United Church of Christ to step into this and have something to say."

Flunder told the meeting that churches will find revitalization when they come out of their buildings and step out on to the "front line of change."

"A lot of division in the church comes from the discontent of our not using our energy for the reason God has given it to us," she said. "Church fights happen because people are not doing Kingdom work. What we're doing is expending our energy trying to sustain an institution. It takes a lot of energy to sustain an institution, but if you take that energy and turn it outward and start doing the work in the street, you don't have to worry so much about bricks and mortar. God will take care of the bricks and mortar as we take care of the work of ministry."

Earlier in the day, at the clergy luncheon honoring pioneer female clergy who broke into the ranks of male-dominated ministry, Flunder said the church today needs "aggravated prophets, agitated prophets."

In his address, Conference Minister The Rev. Kent J. Siladi joined in the call to get loud for justice.

"The Spirit is inviting us to be bold in these times in which we live," he said during his address. "There is a troubling cultural narrative that is swirling around us."

"We cannot or should not sit idly by and be silent about what we hear and see every day that troubles our souls and leaves us in a state of anger, lament and grief," he said.

Siladi suggested that instead, the UCC in Connecticut can create a new legacy built on moving from a culture of fear to one of love; moving from independent to interdependent bodies and together moving from "gathering in" to "sending people out to make our communities, our state, our nation and our world a more just, loving and compassionate place."

Interdependence was another theme of the meeting: on Saturday afternoon, delegates divided into small groups to discuss the idea of the Connecticut, Massachusetts and Rhode Island conferences federating or merging or in some way working more closely together. They submitted questions which were then addressed by Siladi, Massachusetts Conference Minister The Rev. Dr. Jim Antal, and Rhode Island Interim Conference Minister The Rev. Barbara Libby.

Some questioned whether a merger is already a "done deal;" others said they could not judge the idea without knowing more particulars about finances and staffing.

Antal gave assurances that a decision to merge has not been made, and said it would be premature to even discuss what staffing looked like before delegates have gone through a discernment process to decide whether this is an idea they want to pursue.

Siladi agreed, but also challenged delegates to think about what staff positions could be created with a combined budget that cannot be created now. "What would a staff look like if we were to do something new?" he said.

The three conferences will hold a joint Annual Meeting next June, where they likely will be asked to vote on whether to continue toward some type of joining together.

Toward the end of the gathering, The Rev. Walter Pitman of the United Church of Christ in Southbury challenged the three to "give us a statement of purpose" to bring to their churches.

And once again, talk turned toward justice.

"We are the church the world needs now," Siladi said. "Together we can make southern New England a more just, compassionate place."

"That'll work," Pitman said.

# Annual Meeting Speaks Out On Restrooms, Minimum Wage, Greenhouse Gases

Delegates to the 149th Annual Meeting of the Connecticut Conference called on churches to provide gender neutral restrooms, support a \$15 an hour minimum wage and take action to reduce greenhouse gases. They also voted to increase the per capita rate paid by churches to the Conference setting from \$8 to \$10 in 2017.

#### Gender Neutral Restrooms Resolution Approved

Delegates approved a resolution that recommends all future Conference annual meetings be held only in facilities with gender neutral restrooms, and called on the churches of the Conference to "consider creating a more perfect welcome" by designating such restrooms in their own facilities.

This makes the Connecticut Conference the first regional body of the United Church of Christ to make such a commitment for its meetings, according to the Open and Affirming Coalition.

"I have to admit that when I began to consider this resolution I had no idea what an issue this was going to be in the news," said Greg Gray, chair of the Conference's ONA Ministry Team. "But we now have the opportunity to be a prophetic voice."

Gray referred to a Kroger's grocery store sign, which has been taking social media by storm, declaring the store has unisex restrooms "because sometimes gender specific toilets put others into uncomfortable situations."

"We, as the beloved community, can do better than a grocery store," Gray said.

Although there was some discussion about the exact wording of the resolution, it passed with overwhelming support.

#### Minimum Wage Resolution Approved

Delegates also passed a resolution calling on the Conference's Legislative Advocate, and on local church members, to work in support of legislation to raise the state's minimum wage to \$15 an hour. The resolution also asks churches to examine their own compensation to assure all staff are paid at least \$15 an hour by 2019, and it calls on the Conference to make educational resources on the issue available and to forward the resolution to the national General Synod.

David Biklen, of the Immanuel Congregational Church in Hartford, referred to the earlier comment on grocery stores and said "we can make the grocery store itself better" by increasing the minimum wage.

He pointed out that the state's current minimum wage of \$9.60, soon to be increased to \$10, leaves a family of four still thousands of dollars short of the federal minimum poverty level. And The Rev. Damaris Whittaker of the First Church of Christ in Hartford said a two-bedroom apartment in Hartford, Bridgeport and New Haven rents for \$1500 - \$1700 a month - unaffordable to someone making \$10 an hour, or \$1600 a month if they are working full-time. The Rev. Denise Terry, of the East Granby Congregational Church, argued that minimum wage is not sustainable for her congregation or for many small businesses, and said it is not meant to provide a living wage above the poverty line. Terry said there are pastors and other professionals with master's degrees who barely make \$15 an hour, or \$31,200 a year.

Another delegate argued that raising wages for the least skilled and most inexperienced workers would cause all wages to be increased, something not affordable for most businesses, particularly small businesses. He said the poorest people would be the ones to suffer, because their jobs would be eliminated in favor of robots and automation.

Biklen said protections for small businesses have been built into legislation in other states, such as New York, that have increased the minimum wage.

And The Rev. Thea Racelis, of South Congregational Church in Middletown, reminded delegates that those earning minimum wage are not just high school students anymore, but parents with children.

"We're talking about these people as if they are not in this room, in our pews, and in some of our pulpits" she said. "To say that we can't aspire to more than making the bare minimum of the federal poverty line to me is sinful and reprehensible. We are church and we can aspire to more and God's people deserve more."

#### **Resolution On Greenhouse Gas Emissions**

Delegates approved a resolution in support of state legislation to rapidly increase renewable energy resources, and to "declare it imperative" that congregations, individuals, businesses and other entities act to reduce their own levels of greenhouse gas emissions.

The resolution calls on the Conference's Legislative Advocate and churches to support the effort of the Governor's Council on Climate Change, which has been charged with developing a plan to meet the state's mandated goals for reducing greenhouse gas emissions. And it calls on all settings of the church to support the education of clergy and laity on the issues and to "sharpen the focus on what must be our individual and collective visions of a sustainable Creation for our generation and future generations and the whole fabric of earthly life."

Resolution In Opposition Of Marijuana Legalization Rejected

Delegates declined to approve a resolution that would have opposed the further legalization of marijuana in Connecticut. The resolution was brought by the First Congregational Church of Guilford, citing concern that marijuana is a gateway drug that can lead teenagers down the road to more serious addictions. The church wanted the Conference to speak out on the issue before the Legislature considers law changes to make recreational use of marijuana legal in the state.

But several delegates said drug laws are already used disproportionately against poor, urban, minority residents, leading to mass incarceration, and said they were concerned that this action could be seen as favoring more criminal penalties for marijuana use. Other delegates said the churches should be focused on the opioid and heroin addiction crisis in the state, not on marijuana.

#### Per Capita Rate Increased To \$12 In 2017

In other business, delegates approved increasing the per capita rate churches are asked to pay to the Conference setting from \$8 to \$10 in 2017. Delegates, however, declined to approve a second increase to \$12 in 2018.

Several delegates said that counting members is an old method, and that the Conference needs to look at other ways to raise funds. Some said the increase would be a hardship on their churches. Others, however, pointed out that the rate has not been increased since 2011, while expenses have been on the rise.

Several delegates said it did not make sense to commit to a second increase in 2018, when the Conference is discussing the possibility of merging with the Massachusetts and Rhode Island conferences, which could change how the budget is structured.

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
