

Are you aware that when I preach 20-25 minutes it is a result of hours of research and spiritual discernment! I learn so much from my research, I get so much inspiration and blessing. Then, I must turn volumes of information and inspiration into 20-25 minutes. I feel blessed by the opportunity that First Congregational Church in Bloomfield provides me so I can keep growing and serving our beloved Congregation... "Gracias".

I will use this **SPIRE Corner** to share information. I invite you all to grow with me as we share ministry! I hope my reflections will inspire you to research and like me, *grow and rise and rise!*

HARRIET TUBMAN was an American bondwoman who escaped from slavery in the South to become a leading abolitionist before the American Civil War. She was born in Maryland in 1820, and successfully escaped in 1849. Yet she returned many times to rescue both family members and non-relatives from the plantation system. She led hundreds to freedom in the North as the most famous "conductor" on the Underground Railroad, an elaborate secret network of safe houses organized for that purpose. In 1844, Harriet married a free black man named John Tubman. Little is known about John Tubman or his marriage to Harriet. Any children they might have had would have been considered enslaved, since the mother's status dictated that of any offspring. Araminta changed her name to Harriet around the time of her marriage, possibly to honor her mother.

Dr. JAMES W.C. PENNINGTON (1807-1870): At 19 he escaped from slavery. After learning to read and write and gaining education that he paid for himself he became the first black person to graduate from Yale University where he was asked to sit in the back of the room and ask no questions. He was ordained a Congregational Minister and in 1840 served as the Pastor at Faith Congregational church in Hartford, CT. Dr. Pennington was an abolitionist and an American delegate to the Second World Conference on Slavery in London. Rev. John Hooker bought his freedom from his

former master. He wrote and published the first history of blacks in the United States in 1841 *The Origin and History of the Colored People*. I invite you to research more and to share with your loved ones...

BLACKS HAVE MADE SIGNIFICANT CONTRIBUTIONS TO OUR WAY OF LIFE, SUCH AS:

- -The metal oven rack, the egg beater, attachment for the space shuttle, bicycle frame.
- -Railroad railway signal, street car fender, railway switch.
- -Benjamin Banneker-first African American inventor: crop irrigation system.
- -Henry Blair: seed planter, enabled farmers to plant more corn faster with less labor.
- -George Washington Carver: discovered hundreds of new uses for crops-creating new markets for farmers.
- -Frederick M Jones: held over 60 patents, specialized in refrigeration.
- -Lewis Howard Latimer: invented incandescent light bulb with carbon filament.
- -Do your research and be proud of the contributions made by our Black Sisters & Brothers in the USA and the world.

The sight of pale yellow-tinged daffodil buds pushing up through the cold soil is an encouraging signal that winter is retreating. 





Church Council Minutes 1/20/16

Attendees: C. Delgado, E. Ayala *ex officio*, S. Goetjen, C. Wilson. The meeting opened with a reading and prayer by Pastor Ayala.

Pastor's Report: Three-Kings Sunday was well-received. There is a positive spirit in the church as we move forward with emphasis on community-building. Next Sunday, Pastor Ayala has invited Imam Sammy Aziz from the Bloomfield Muslim Community Center to worship with us. Church staffing is going smoothly. A morning Bible study group with Dorine and Pastor Ed will begin tomorrow. All are welcome! Pastor Ed continues to meet regularly with the Parish Care Team and is trying to do one or two visits each week. He is also involved in the Bloomfield Interfaith Group.

Search Committee: Council reviewed and discussed information from UCC about how to proceed in the "Search and Call" process. Carolyn had prepared for Council's review, a draft of tasks that need to be accomplished to initiate the search process for a settled pastor. An approximate time line for the beginning steps was established. Communication will be sent to the congregation through church email, Spire, announcements, and Sunday bulletins outlining the qualifications needed, and seeking recommendations for those members who might be willing to serve on the Search Committee. Additional Business: Council needs to add a member to replace Doug Morrill who has recently moved to North Carolina. Recommendations are being sought. The joint Council, Ministry Team and Staff meeting originally scheduled for Feb. 6th has been rescheduled for Feb. 20th from 9-12. The meeting will be to review strategic priorities, see how things are progressing and seek recommendations for planning forward to the end of the fiscal year.

Financial Report: Income - Pledges to date are \$148,000 which appears to be above budget, but is due to some pledges having been paid in full for the year. Music income is up because of recent amounts collected to pay Jason through June. Building income is up because some payments for last year's rents were collected...Most expenses show as being at or below budget because of timing, which will balance as the year progresses. Special music is over budget due to hiring individuals to sing in the choir and the Cantata.

The meeting closed with a Navaho blessing. Next meeting will be March 16 at 7 p.m.

The Council is committed to making the task of selecting the Search Committee members a process that is open

and transparent and one that involves the entire congregation. Over the next several weeks you will be receiving information about how each of you can be involved in this important and exciting event in the life of our church.

Included in this edition of the Spire is a description of the commitments for Search Committees. Please read this, consider it prayerfully and be open to how God may be calling you or others in the congregation to participate in the search process.

Council is completing a description of the qualities and attributes that individuals should have to be considered for selection as a Search Committee member. We have also developed a process for actively involving the congregation in making these recommendations to Council. Over the next month information about the process will be made available to the congregation in a variety of ways.

The Search Committee will be comprised of church members in regular standing and will reflect the diversity of our church family. Committee membership will be balanced to include an equal representation of women and men, young and old, new and long-term members and persons involved in the ministries of the church.

Our church is a joyful, vibrant, healthy and spirit-filled community of faith. Let's approach the search and call for a settled pastor with enthusiasm, hope and wonder and be open to God's call in this process. Blessings to all of you!

FIVE COMMITMENTS FOR SEARCH COMMITTEES

A Faith Commitment... The task of the Search Committee is very simple and very complex. Initially the task is spiritual. Search Committee members make a faith commitment to develop as faith-centered, prayer-directed people of God willing to listen to God in the process of seeking a new pastor. Search Committee members engage in a 4-Way Covenant—a Covenant with their prospective pastor, the congregation, the Conference and Association, and the Holy Spirit.

A Time Commitment... Search Committee members make a time commitment. By the time the search process is completed (from first organizational meeting to the calling of a new pastor) the committee may have been working together for as little as 9 months or as long as 18-24 months. Initially most Search Committees meet weekly. Once committees begin considering pastoral profiles and scheduling interviews, the frequency of meetings increases. At times the Search Committee must travel to hear prospective pastors preach. All in all, it is a significant time commitment.

A Commitment to Confidentiality... Search Committee members make a commitment to confidentiality. Members must not talk about the content of their work. That is to say, the sharing of names of individuals under consideration is a serious breach of process. Even to speak in generalities about location or experience or gender can risk folk guessing who the committee is considering. The congregation must be kept informed at every step of the process. Sharing where the Search Committee is in the process is critical. However, until a final candidate is presented, all conversation about any candidates is closely guarded.

A Commitment to Openness . . . Search Committees make a commitment to genuine consideration of all candidates. The commitment involves understanding that the gifts, skills, and experience of candidates are primary in determining their ability to serve the congregation.

A Commitment to Consensus. . . Finally, Search Committee members make a commitment to consensus. Members need to be of one mind in recommending their prospective pastor to the congregation. Any unreadiness on the part of any member of the Search Committee can and often does spell disaster down the road. Everyone must be able, with a clear and positive conscience, to support and endorse the individual presented before the congregation.

- Collect coins for a charity or cause.
- When you can't attend an event, give the tickets to strangers.
- Provide tutoring or mentoring in your field of expertise.
- Offer to babysit or pet-sit for free.
- Send a note of appreciation to someone who's made a difference in your life.
- Share your gifts of music, reading or conversation at a nursing home.
- Donate old sports equipment to schools.
- Give someone the benefit of the doubt maybe even a family member or yourself!



Resolve to revitalize

Church revitalization is a hot topic, and ideas for congregations can bring fresh energy and meaning to personal and family life, too. Consider the following tips:

- Have a clear vision. It's easy to go along day to day without considering what you're moving toward. Beyond the everyday routine, what bigger vision does God have for you? This year, take specific steps toward living that out.
