

## Commentary: Justice work means working with the most vulnerable

Justice work means working with the most vulnerable. by Zach Wolgemuth Executive, UCC Disaster Ministries Issue #877 | January 22, 2017 WITNESS for JUSTICE A weekly commentary from the United Church of Christ When we think of justice advocacy, we often think actions such as writing letters to congress, marching on Capitol Hill or participating in a boycott. Few of us would consider disasters to be linked to justice work because disasters don't discriminate... or do they? It is true that many natural disasters impact rich and poor; young and old; black and white; educated and uneducated; insured and uninsured; employed and unemployed, but the reality is that certain communities are more susceptible to disasters than others. Because of systemic injustices, they are more vulnerable. Recently I traveled to Port Arthur, TX, in response to flooding from Hurricane Harvev. Port Arthur was inundated by floodwaters leaving many of its families and residents with few options. The median income there is approximately \$32,000, barely half of the national average. Nearly 30 percent of the city lived in poverty in 2015, a percentage that most has certainly increased since the flooding. For the past 12 years I've traveled throughout the U.S and around the globe responding to disasters of all types, scale and scope. I sorely wish I could say that what Port Arthur experienced was a coincidence or an anomaly, but it is not. As often as I see impoverished communities impacted by disaster, low income families too are disproportionately affected when disasters strike, simply because of factors that relate to their socioeconomic status, race or education. Disasters expose the inequality, injustices and prejudices in our society, yet they also provide a unique opportunity to respond as well. I strongly believe that justice work should be interwoven into our everyday lives. Justice work is difficult, it's dirty, it requires being vulnerable, placing ourselves in another's shoes, and being willing to learn and grow in our own understanding of what a "Just World For All" really means. Each day I am personally challenged to step out in faith and seek ways to do

justice, love mercy and walk humbly with my God. 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In 2017, the Connecticut Conference took an historic first step toward forming a new, unified conference with our siblings in Massachusetts and Rhode Island. This Conference has long known that together, we can do more to live the love of justice and Jesus than we can do alone. This move toward uniting is the next natural step on our journey.

In the meantime, here is a look back at what we as a Conference did together in 2017:

### Silver Lake Conference Center

918 young people learned leadership through 37 summer conferences (500 attended environmental justice training)
This was an increase of 109 campers over the previous year—an important reversal in what had been a downward trend.

- 75 deans, 124 counselors, and 7 chaplains volunteered to lead, nurture, and inspire
- 47 dedicated summer staff sang, cleaned, ran, protected, and mentored the conferees
- More than 3000 youth and adults enjoyed weekend retreats at Silver Lake during the spring and fall
- \$67,950 in sponsorships were provided to 287 campers by individuals, churches and associations
- \$31,625 in Silver Lake Scholarships were awarded to 106 individuals
- The Golf Tournament and Fancy Camp Gala raised nearly \$20,000 to support the ministry of Silver Lake
- 8 multiracial youth welcomed to 4th Annual Environmental Justice For All! Retreat

### Youth and Young Adult Ministries

- 32 youth attended Youth@Synod as part of a collaborative CT/MA/RI Tri-Conference trip to Baltimore
- 250 Giv2 (Give Squared) participants from 5 chapters gave close to 600 service hours to CT Communities
- 110 youth and adults gathered at the Interfaith Youth Hangout at First Congregational Church of Middletown
- 173 attended Youth Revival in West Hartford, and offered \$944 for refugee resettlement
- 130 confirmands from 15 churches participated in CTUCC Confirmation Retreats, which included Creation Care Workshops
- 5 Thinking About Working for God Apprentices explored call through this signature CTUCC job shadow program
- CTUCC partnered with First Church Simsbury to support the Young Adult Service Community program

### **Inspiring & Supporting Vital Ministry**

- 283 Leaders attended 2 Super Saturday Events
- 250 leaders from 16 congregations participated in 12 Safe Conduct Trainings
- 50 leaders from 18 congregations took part in Stepping Stones Christian Education workshops
- 9 facilitators were trained to begin work with Clergy Excellence Groups
- 40 pastors connect with the Conference Minister in one-on-one conversations
- 25 people began transitional, interim, bridge or designated term pastorates
- 12 people became Members in Discernment
- 11 new clergy were ordained and 19 clergy began new settled pastorates
- 48 delegates, 12 youth delegates and 10 staff sent to General Synod in Baltimore



### Justice Ministries

### Racial Justice:

- 20 churches completed either a racial justice training or a sacred conversation on race
- 25 middle school youth engaged in the "Did You Know?" youth racial justice curriculum
- ALL Silver Lake summer staff went through 6 hours of racial justice training

### Environmental Justice:

- Environmental Justice workshops and discussions held at 3 churches
- 4 interfaith climate justice vigils in CT were coordinated and several nationwide actions were promoted
- 175 people began receiving a new monthly newsletter with updates on environmental issues

### **Economic Justice:**

- 14 faith denominations/organizations were brought together into the Coalition Against Casino Expansion
- 70 people attended a meeting in opposition to a casino in East Windsor and 13 leaders spoke out at the state capitol
- The Conference Minister was arrested while advocating for the marginalized

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### (DRAFT) CHURCH COUNCIL MINUTES 1-17-18

Attendees: R. Robinson, C. Delgado, S. Goetjen, J. Casner, C. Wilson. The meeting opened with a prayer. The December Council Minutes were accepted as presented.

**FINANCIAL UPDATE**: The FCCB Child Development Center has received notice that the Town of Bloomfield has denied their request to be exempt from paying personal property tax on equipment used in the center. Scott will file an appeal application by Feb. 20. The financial report for the end of Dec. 2017 shows that pledges are above budget for the month because of year-end payments made by some members. Free offering and rental income are down a bit, but we are on track. Expenses are generally in line with the budget. Minister's expenses are lower. Prosser fund expenses are up because of state cuts. Larger costs for Prosser and Gale will be covered by Investments and Trusts.

**PERSONNEL**: Carolyn continues to be in contact with the staff. She plans to meet on a more regular basis with Shantel, Director of the Child Development Center, and Mary of Facilities Team. The staff should be complimented on doing a great job in the absence of a minister.

SEARCH COMMITTEE UPDATE: Ursula sent an email report to Council that we are not yet close to making an offer for a settled pastor, but the team is committed to finding the right person for our church. A number of profiles are still under review, and hopefully more will come in from the Conference. There are a number of churches in the Hartford area searching for a minister at present. Council came up with a few clarifications to be explored with Ursula and supports the goal that the strongest focus should be on fulfilling the criteria and characteristics outlined in our

church profile regardless of age, race, gender, etc. when reviewing a candidate.

**INTERIM PASTOR UPDATE**: Pastor Tamara Moreland, Regional Conference Minister, has asked if we would consider a part-time person (20-25 hours/week) as she continues to help us to find someone for the interim period. Council agreed to consider this option.

**STEWARDSHIP**: On Feb. 4 following the morning worship service, there will be a meeting with Brett, as this year's leader of stewardship, team leaders, and Council to brainstorm about the upcoming stewardship campaign. In order to meet the expense of a full-time pastor and maintain the current budget level of all other expenses we will need a 10% increase in pledges for the next fiscal year.

**NOMINATING**: Mary has agreed to remain as Facilities Team leader.

**SECURITY**: Following the meeting in Meriden with the State Police on providing safety at the church, one of the suggestions was to lock the doors after the service has started and have a person stationed at one designated entrance to admit latecomers. Signs would be placed on the other entrances indicating at which door access would be available. Five years ago Mary had the town police do a walkthrough of the building with regard to suggestions for safety for the Child Development Center. This resulted in security upgrades currently in place for the preschool. Council will ask Mary to share any information that the church could use to further enhance safety at a future council meeting

Ron expressed appreciation to Deacons and staff for taking on extra duties in the absence of a minister. The meeting ended with a prayer.

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### Ministry Updates

### MISSION BOARD MINUTES 12/11/17

<u>ATTENDANCE</u>: Kay, Betsy, David, Lucy, Judi, Jane, Eunice, Sandy Weigt November minutes were accepted.

THANKSGIVING BASKETS: Thank you letters have been sent. We collected \$1500 and had \$532 already in the account. We spent \$1135.80 for gift cards and extra groceries. (Stop and Shop donated an additional \$500 we used towards gift cards). \$896.20 was left. We will spend \$300 on Stop and Shop gift cards for Andrea to hand out to members in need and keep the rest in the account for next year.

PROSSER FUND: \$37,938.84 has been spent since July. This is about half of what was in the account. This is over our annual budget but additional money was in the account due to not having spent the budgeted amount in prior years. The need seems to be great right now and we discussed what we should do if requests keep coming in and the money is depleted. Do we drain the account and then have no cushion for over-runs in the future? Jane would like to let Social Services know that we don't have an endless amount of money so they are aware that we can't fund at this rate through the end of the fiscal year. This way they can look for other sources first for some needs.

**<u>CSI</u>**: Nothing new to report.

**COVENANT TO CARE**: Judi reports we are still with the same social worker. Toys are coming in for Christmas.

**BACKPACK PROGRAM**: Eunice reported that new names are being added and they are now up to fifty-three backpacks each week. They may add a school in Hartford in January. Food costs about \$11 per backpack. They have received about a third of their budget already in donations.

### **HYACINTH WILLIAMS FOUNDATION:**

Eunice is setting up a self-sufficiency program in Jamaica. So far five families have received chickens and feed and boosters at an initial outlay of \$200 per family. After six weeks they can sell all of the chickens for \$300 and reinvest the money so they have seventy-five chickens. This will continue so they will eventually be able to

keep some of the profit as income. David moved to spend \$400 to sponsor two families and Betsy seconded. After discussion about our budget and other expenditures we decided to table the decision until January.

AL ASMI FAMILY: Fade is employed at City Steam Restaurant and Blue Plate Kitchen. He has also catered an event for Lucy at Manchester Community College. All family members have had their medical exams in the green card applications process. They continue to take classes in learning English and dealing with the life struggles they are presented with.

**Transition and Pastoral Coverage:** Carolyn updated the group on the Church Council's progress in finding an interim minister while the search process for our new settled pastor continues. Rev. Davida Foy Crabtree has agreed to provide pastoral coverage if an urgent need arises before we have an interim. The group also discussed possible supply ministers we may employ.

February 11: Last Sunday before Lent is also closest to FCCB's birthday on February14, marking 280 years in 2018. Dee will contact town government and the Bloomfield Messenger about commemorating and covering this significant anniversary. A Birthday/Mardi Gras potluck is also proposed for the occasion. Andrea will reach out to the other church teams for commitments to help – from planning thru cleanup. Additionally, that will be Racial Justice Sunday and its assigned theme is Compassionate Caring, elements that resonate strongly in our congregation.

**February 14 (Ash Wednesday):** We will not hold an Ash Wednesday service this year. We agreed to explore the possibility of joining with the Methodist Church if they are having a service. A listing of area services will be compiled also for distribution.

**February 18:** First Sunday in Lent. Lenten theme this year will be "We Are Here!" – exploring how we live as Christians in the world we inhabit. In support of the theme, we will publish an appeal for personal reflections from members of the congregation. The goal is to have reflections for the 40 days of Lent to be included in the weekly bulletin and the church e-news. The reflections may be signed or anonymous as each writer prefers.

February 23 anniversary of ONA at FCCB will be celebrated on the 18<sup>th</sup>. The Bell Choir plays that day and the theme is "God's Loving Paths."

**February 25:** Theme is "Always Close."
