Pastor's Message



Hello Everyone,

Many of you are feeling the pressure of so many factors - including, but far from limited to - the pandemic, the election, social dynamics, the environment and global dynamics. Inside the pages of this newsletter are some of the many wonderful things that continue to take place by the power of discipleship and the support of the Holy Spirit. I hope you enjoy going through them. It is all very impressive. That being said, I know many of you are wondering about what's next with the church. Here is an update on the "Moving Forward" efforts – a LOT has been going on.

Survey

Thank you to everyone who make the time to complete the survey. We had an excellent response. If you haven't done that yet and would like to do so, you are still welcome to send it in. If you need us to send you one, just let us know.

About half of the congregation wants to wait until there is a viable vaccine or other longerterm solution to Covid before returning to the building for worship. The other half of people who responded said they would be interested in returning under the parameters we outlined.

Creating a "Sanctuary Service" Team

Some work is already underway to prepare the sanctuary. Pews were sanitized and other steps taken to make sure we have a very safe space for everyone.

We need a group of people to help with various tasks – registering of people who come, ushers to help people get to the right "safe spots" designated in the pews and various other roles in order to do this. Gatherings We Had

We continue to brainstorm about additional events we could have in-person or online that would offer creative programming and ways to connect. We know you all have great ideas too, and we would like to hear them as well.

Most Recent Medical Information

Unfortunately, with all of the positives, the medical situation is rapidly moving against us. You have heard the trends on the national scale. Here in the State of Connecticut, a state that has done better than most if not all states in the Country in managing this pandemic, Positivity Rates are now over 4%. It was 1% in June and 3% last week. Deaths in the State were 33 in the month of August. They are already 87 in October with a week to go at the time of this writing.

Locally, here in Bloomfield, the Daily Case Rate per 100,000 people has steadily increased form the mid-single digits to 10.7 two weeks ago to 11.7 in the latest two-week trend report, with the second week higher than the first by 19%. Surrounding towns are also rising. Hartford has a daily case rate per 100,000 over 19. They could go much higher. New London is over 40.

Where We Stand Now

We will continue to build the appropriate protocols and train the right people for the proper positions for when we can return. We had hoped November 8th might be that date. However, with the recent medical trends increasing as significantly as they are, that wouldn't be the right decision at this time. We are now looking at sometime in Advent if the trends improve.

Next Steps

We will continue to prepare ourselves to be ready for worship in the sanctuary when the conditions permit. We will closely monitor the medial trends. We will also work to create more ways for us to gather in meaningful ways in small groups where we can and online. No matter what, we will continue to offer a high-quality Online Worship Experience. Again, please send us your ideas as to what you feel would be helpful for you and it very well may be helpful for others as well.

Stones Of Hope



Stones of Hope

"Stones of Hope" is the opportunity for our congregation to spread God's love, hope and compassion throughout our community. In many ways it is therapeutic for the artist and a sign of hope, renewal and love for those who see the Stones of Hope in our world. Here's how it works;

The Deacons will have a basket of 2"-3" river rocks that will be kept on the front stairs of our Church.

They are there for those who would like to take a stone or two and to paint them with acrylic paints. The paintings can be representative of whatever moves you to share God's love with others. Typical paintings use the words LOVE, PEACE, JOY, GOD LOVES YOU, STAY STRONG, YOU WILL SURVIVE, YOU GOT THIS, BLM, etc. You can also paint the stones with a scripture verse or a picture. Please also turn the stones over and do your best to paint Bloomfield Congregational Church (or BCC) on the back. After the paint dries you can put a coat of polyurethane on the stone to protect your work from the weather.

Once your "Stones of Hope" are done you have two choices. You can take them out into the community and leave them in places where people will take notice or you can bring them back and place them on the front stairs. The Deacons will distribute the "Stones of Hope" throughout our community.

The stones that you paint will be uplifting to many who see them in the community as they go about their day. They may see one that has a profound impact on them or someone they love. They may pick up the stone and carry it in their pocket or place it in their house where it will continue to provide them with a sense that they are not alone and that God loves them.

Our hope is that this will catch on and spread throughout our community, State and Country. It is a simple gift that you can provide to others, most of whom you will never know. Have fun, be creative and help us spread God's love in Bloomfield and beyond!!

Community Kitchen Reaches 2nd Anniversary

WOW - just wow. Two years ago, on October 20th of 2018, we served our first Community Meal of our Bloomfield Congregational Church Community Kitchen! Wow just wow. We started with a vision. That vision was to do more than simply feed people. It was to build community in a time when human connections are under attack. We also served over 19,000 meals. Nineteen THOUSAND meals. In two years... Wow.





Then in March, we completely pivoted the program when Covid hit. Turning the program into a "Drive Through" precision operation of love. In the seven months since we shifted to the "Drive Through" format, the Community Kitchen has served over 8,500 meals. Eight THOUSAND, five hundred - in seven months.



Thank you to so many people who helped us get this off the ground, grow it and keep it going safely during the pandemic. You are amazing.

Sacred Conversations Hits One Year Anniversary



In October, we reached an amazing milestone in our Sacred Conversations Towards Ending Racism. We reached the One Year Anniversary of the start of this important initiative. A lot was done by many people. I'm not just talking about the important work of the Sacred Conversations Team, our faithful facilitator Martey Rhine, our Council, Deacons and others who helped to make this possible.

I'm talking about the good work, the hard work, the necessary work done by everyone who participated. Things like digging into the history, doing the deeper discernment in our own time

and by doing the assignments in between sessions. All of this in order to have the important, often difficult conversations to make this a valuable process. Rather than describe this more, here are some of the thoughts participants had as they reflected on what they experienced in this year:

- "I thought the world was fair. I thought we were beyond these racial issues. I'm glad my world was opened up and that I can now see the truth and do something about it."
- "I was nervous going into this. Worried about reliving hurts. However, it turns out this has been a very positive and healing process for me."
- "I'm glad we did this. It is making a real difference."
- "These sessions are eye opening as we learn about our history, our white privilege, and open ourselves to hear the perspectives of Black, Indigenous and other People of Color (BIPOC) and other white people. It is helping us to build and deepen our relationships. It is also therapeutic and cathartic to have a space where we can be honest about our viewpoints and experiences."
- "We appreciate the church's and Pastor Shawn's willingness to do this work on a long-term basis."
- "We need to speak up and speak out."

Indeed. This is a long-term investment, and we do need to speak up and speak out. We will. We are invested in this. Jesus calls us to learn and to speak and to act in matters of social justice. And that is exactly what we will do - together.

New Executive Conference Minister of SNEUCC



Recently, after several years of discernment, discussion and transition, the Connecticut, Massachusetts and Rhode Island Conferences of the United Church of Christ (UCC) came together as one. This new conference is now called the Southern New England Conference, also known as the SNEUCC. A national search took place to find the first leader of this newly merged SNEUCC Conference. We are truly blessed to let you know that Rev. Darrell Goodwin was offered the

position, accepted the offer and was voted into the role at a recent gathering of pastors and lay leaders of the new SNEUCC. Below is some of his background. You may also be interested to know that he decided to make Bloomfield his home! We plan to have him with us (in person or virtually) on Sunday, February 14th. Here is a bit of his background.

The Rev. Darrell L. Goodwin, a Chicago native, served the Iowa, Nebraska, and South Dakota Conferences as an Associate Conference Minister based in Omaha, NE. Rev. Darrell is also the Program Director of the Pension Boards' Faith and Personal Finance Initiative, a project funded by a \$1 million grant from the Lilly Endowment's National Initiative to Address Economic Challenges Facing Pastoral Leaders.

In his 20 years of ministerial experience, the Rev. Goodwin has also served in higher education and in varied ministry settings of the United Church of Christ and Church of God in Christ.

The Rev. Goodwin holds a Bachelor of Arts in Human Development and Theology from Boston College; a Master of Education in Higher Education and Student Affairs Administration from The University of Vermont; a Master of Arts in Transforming Spirituality from Seattle University; and is currently a doctoral candidate in San Francisco Theological Seminary's Doctor of Ministry program.

"My desire to serve the people of the Southern New England Conference is inspired by your boldness to form a new conference with a mission and vision toward the marginalized," he said. "I hope to bring my commitment to justice which has been curated by the Holy Spirit, my love of God's people, and administrative gifts to propel this vision forward."
